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Mario R. Mr. McClain earned both his Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and Bachelor of Science in Sociology and Criminal Justice from the University of Rhode Island (URI), and studied abroad at the University of Salamanca, Spain. While at URI, he was a founding member and President of the Police Student Advisory Committee, a course instructor for the URI 101 Mentor organization, and served as a Civility Mentor and Residence Hall Team leader, where he modeled and taught bystander responsibility, provided education and facilitated proactive programs that addressed issues of civility.
